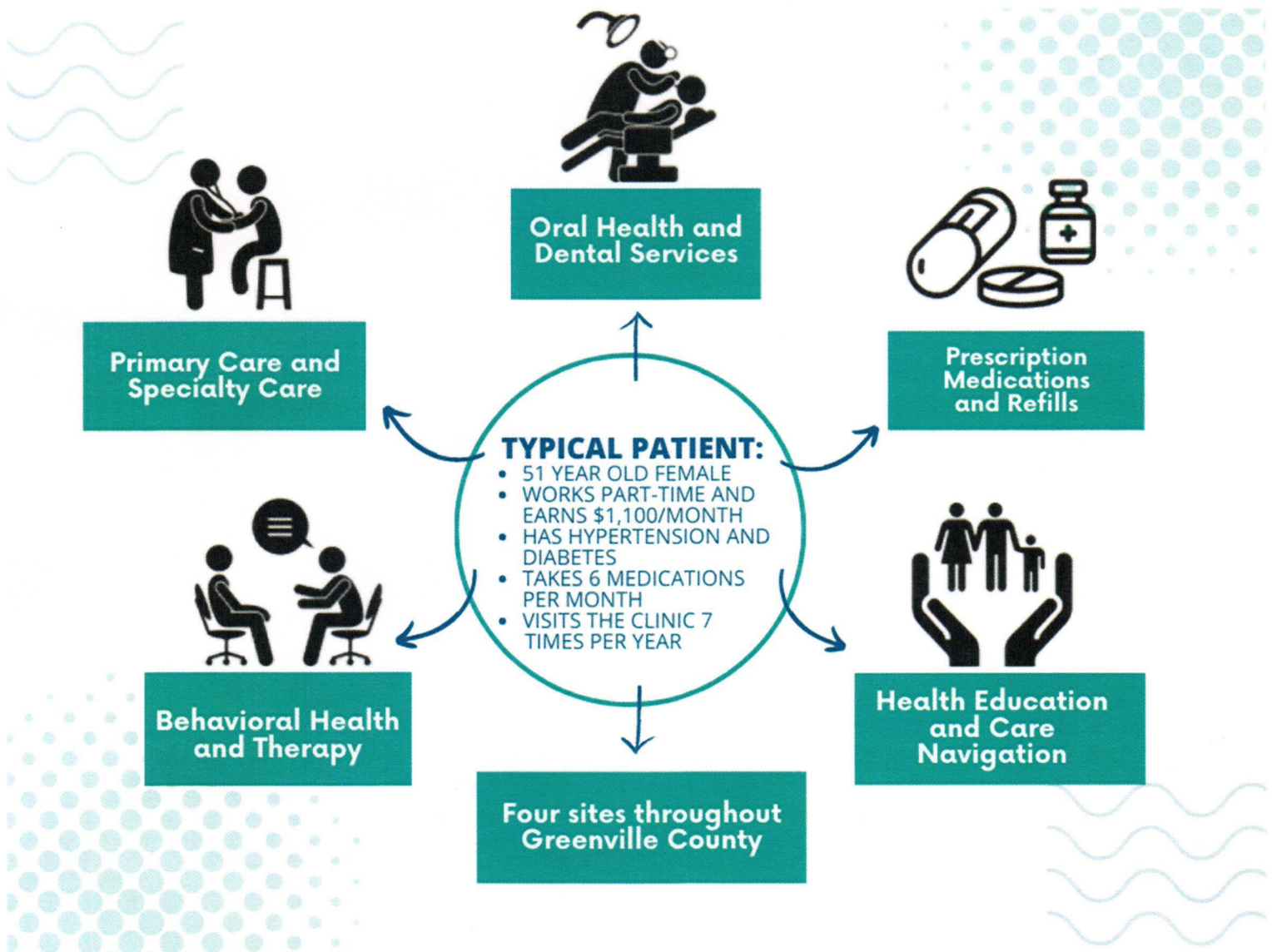

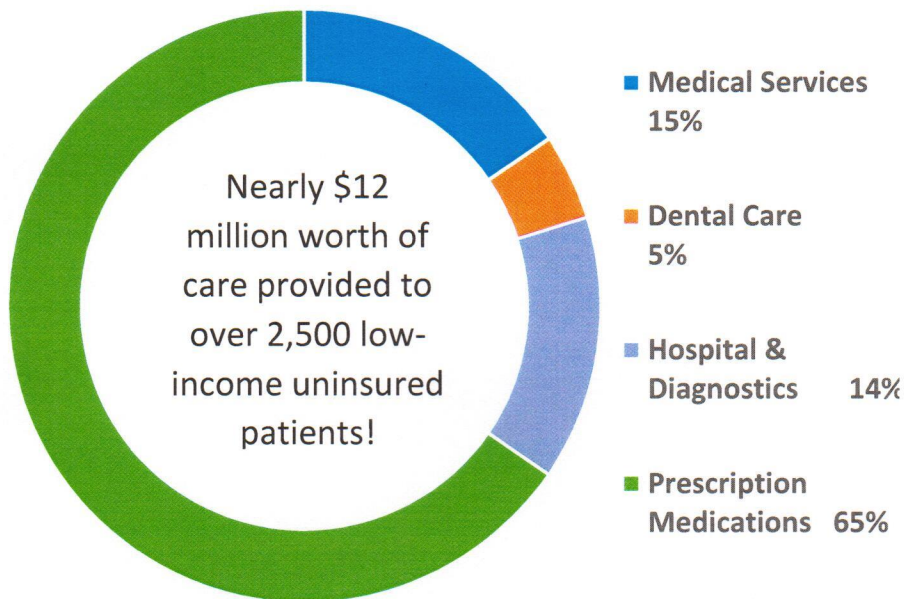

Revenue sources included:

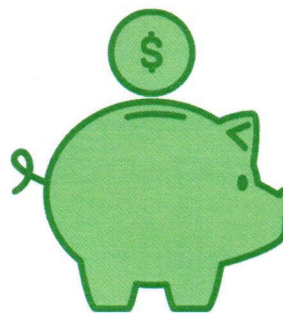

## What makes it possible?



### VOLUNTEERISM

Over 500 volunteers donate their professional services to provide health care for our patients: physicians, dentists, nurses, pharmacists and others!



### PHILANTHROPY

We rely on your donations and community grants for support. We are not government-subsidized and our low-income patients do not have any insurance.



### PARTNERSHIPS

We work closely with both local health systems, community organizations and educational institutions to provide a broad range of quality health services

**1985:** Community Assessment Planning Study (United Way) identifies the need for a community health clinic for the underserved

**1986:** Christ Church leases former Jervey Eye Clinic building at 709 Dunbar to clinic organizers for \$1 per year



**November 11, 1987:** GFMC opens, providing general medical visits on Tuesday and Thursday evenings

**1992:** Wednesday daytime clinic added utilizing retired physicians

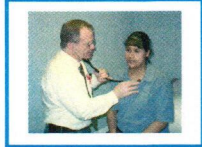
**1994:** GFMC volunteers honored with United Way's Golden Rule Award 'Volunteer(s) of the Year'

**1994:** Gynecology clinic opens 2 Monday evenings per month

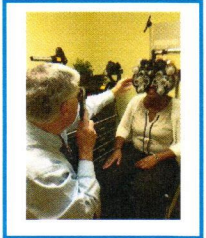


**1995:** Dental clinic opens for extractions 2 evenings per week

**1998:** GFMC moves in to current building, doubling the space and adding in-house pharmacy



**1997:** Capital campaign conducted communitywide to raise \$1.3 million for new building

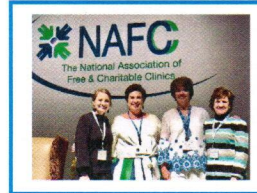


**1999:** Minor Surgery Clinic opens once per month

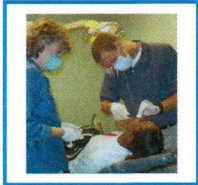
**1998:** Weekly Eye Clinic opens

**2000-2002:** First satellite clinic site at Northwest Crescent Center opens, followed by Greer (2001) and Golden Strip

**2005:** GFMC provides dental care to approximately 50 Hurricane Katrina evacuees staying at the Palmetto Expo



**2001:** GFMC joins as one of the charter members to form the National Association of Free Clinics; Director Suzie Foley subsequently serves on the NAFC Board of Directors 2009-2017

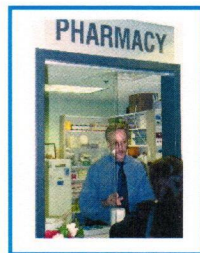


**2009:** Partnership with MUSC Dental School begins for senior students to provide restorative services 4 days per week

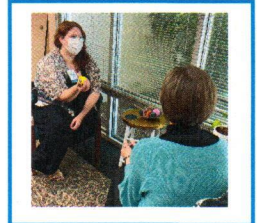
**2012:** Bon Secours assigns a full-time NP to GFMC

**2013:** Mental health therapist added to provide counseling services

**2014:** SC Healthy Outcomes Program (HOP) partnerships with Prisma Health and Bon Secours to connect uninsured hospital high-utilizers to GFMC



**2014:** Hepatitis C treatment program begun, in partnership with Gilead Sciences (Sovaldi)



**2015:** Major expansion of pharmacy partnerships for bulk replenishments (AstraZeneca, Merck, Pfizer, Direct Relief, Dispensary of Hope)

**2015:** Diabetes Prevention Program (DPP) initiated and Diabetes Self-Management programs enhanced



**2018:** Medical Residents from Prisma begin rotation at GFMC



**2016:** Weekly free "Market" instituted to distribute fresh fruits and vegetables to patients

**2019:** Expanded Eye Clinic opens

**2019:** Selected as Pilot Clinic for national Quality Improvement project 'Roadmap to Health Equity'

**2020-2022:** GFMC remains open during Covid-19 pandemic, receiving CARES and PPP funding to continue services

**2022:** Epic electronic health record system implemented, enhancing shared patient communication and coordinated care
